Study History More Effectively

As your students progress through school, it is important that they learn history in greater detail. For example, they should not just know the date of the Battle of Gettysburg; they should also understand why it was an important turning point in the Civil War. Try some of these tips to get you started:

- Use many different sources when studying a particular subject. Students should understand different points of view on a subject.
- Students should ask questions when learning. For example; "Why did that occur?" or "How might things have gone differently?"
- Create a timeline of events so that your student has a visual representation of when and where events occurred in chronological order.

In October, we held the Fall-o-ween Book Walk and Literacy parent workshop. THE GEORGIA SLDS PARENT PORTAL

The Georgia Statewide Longitudinal Data System (SLDS) is a free online tool developed by the Georgia Department of Education that helps States, Districts, Schools, and Teachers make data-driven decisions to improve student learning. Parents now have access to their children's SLDS data through the SLDS Parent Portal. The SLDS Parent Portal is accessible to parents directly through their district's student information system—that means no additional logins and passwords to remember!

BENEFITS OF THE SLDS PARENT PORTAL

Using Georgia's SLDS Parent Portal helps parents to:

- Monitor their children's achievement on statewide summative assessments.
- Identify their children's strengths and weaknesses in the domains that are tested in each subject area.
- Access online resources that are directly aligned to their children's course standards.

HOW TO ACCESS THE GADOE PARENT PORTAL

Parents can access the Georgia SLDS Parent Portal by logging in to the district's Student Information System Parent Portal, then clicking the SLDS Portal button on the Parent Portal landing page.

2018-2019 Crescent Fall Parent Survey Summary

Crescent Elementary School had 186 responses to the Title I Fall Parent Survey.

Grades reporting:

Pre-Kindergarten – 15% Kindergarten – 30% First – 13% Second – 21% Third – 13% Fourth – 19%
Fifth – 17%

Responses from parents of students in:

Regular Classroom Instruction – 87%
English Speakers to Other Languages (ESOL) – 1%
Gifted Program (Program Challenge) – 24%
Migrant Program – 0%
Special Education Program – 12%

98% of parents believed their child was prepared to transition to the next grade.

97% of parents are aware of what their child is expected to learn in all subject areas.

Most effective communication methods in giving parents information regarding school/district parent engagement activities:

#1 – Emails 80%
#2 – Social Media 65%
#3 – Automated Phone Calls 58%
#4 – Parent-Teacher Conferences 49%
#5 – School Newsletters 38%

Important to improve communications:

#1 – Progress reports and report cards 100%
#2 – Sharing how my child is doing often and in many ways 100%
#3 – Parent-Teacher Conferences 97%

Parent Struggles:

#1 – Attending school functions 57%
#2 – Motivating my child academically 34%
#3 – Accessing the Parent Portal (Infinite Campus) 30%

59% of parents are interested in attending classes, workshops or programs on how parents can help children have more academic success.

97% of parents feel their child's school provides parents with opportunities to share feedback and ideas regarding the school's parental engagement program and activities to be very important and important.

Top 3 staff training topics:

#1 – How to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners 71%
#2 – Building ties between parents and the school 63%
#3 – Encouraging and supporting parents in more fully participating in the education of their child 63%

Top 5 topics of interest:

#1 – Math Skills 53%
#2 – Reading Strategies 50%
#3 – Standards and Curriculum 49%
#4 – Preparing for Standardized Tests 45%
#5 – Interpreting Test Results 35%

99% of the responding parents feel that the school is the most convenient location to attend a workshop or meeting.

49% of the responding parents feel that Monday is the most convenient day to attend a workshop or meeting.

60% of the responding parents feel that evenings after school are the most convenient times to attend a workshop or meeting.

Parent Need for Workshops:

Access to information online – 57%
Meetings offered more than once – 38%
Transportation – 1%
Child Care – 32%
Translator – 1%

35% of parents indicated they plan to use the school or district Parent Resource Center.
